A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR...

This last year has had some transitions within it. April 1, 2022 we moved Ministries from Ministry of Attorney General to Ministry of Community Children & Social Services. With any change there is time needed to adjust and adapt to the new expectations and build relationships with new personnel. I am happy to indicate this transition has gone smoothly. We are also pleased to be getting back to "normal" operation post COVID impacts. This includes more in person opportunities for both education/awareness/fundraising as well as client supports.

Despite COVID being behind us we have seen a shift in the desired form of support from clients coming in through more phone and email referrals rather than in person connections. It is unclear currently if this is a permanent shift. We have been pleased that we continue to offer support in a client centered manner and respond to "where the client is at" referring to both geographically and emotionally. We have also seen a shift in the level of need within our client population. Post COVID has highlighted struggles being faced by our clients to not only be focused on what the referral was based on but typically a compound complexity to issues that may surround the crisis or impact the healing journey.

Being part of a 24hr/365 day a year program can present some challenges to ensure we can provide the best quality of service possible. We rely heavily on our on-call system and support from our volunteer Crisis Responders to ensure every call for support is met in the way the client is requesting it. This may be in person or by phone. It may be during the day or in the middle of the night. When we are called, we respond no matter what the time or location is. Despite these complexities we were able to respond to 195 more calls for support and served 335 more people than the previous fiscal year.

Victim Services of Huron County has fantastic people; the volunteer Board, volunteer Crisis Responders and the staff make this work appear easy and makes support to people that need it a reality! Thank you to the staff and a special thanks to ALL the volunteers - you are all truly appreciated.

It is my pleasure to thank the Board of Directors for the valuable work they do in sharing their areas of expertise and guiding our organization forward. We appreciate your energy and commitment to making VSHC valuable, accountable, and successful. Your magnitude of support and the MANY hours you contribute often goes unnoticed, but I am very aware of your time, energy and commitment and I am grateful. I am sad to see Jim Dietrich and Tabatha Fisher, two Board members leave the organization. The wealth of support and encouragement the Board offers is difficult to summarize and demonstrate the full appreciation it deserves.

The ongoing services and program development would have not been possible without the generous support from our donors, funders, volunteers, stakeholders, direction from the Board of Directors and the commitment of the staff. In partnership with VQRP+ (Victim Quick Response Program+), we continue to advocate for the needs within our community. We strive to better communicate the uniqueness of our program to the public. We will focus on outcomes and learn what impact VSHC has on the community - and how to achieve better program results.



We continue to make measurable progress in the areas of prevention work and in strengthening ties to the education community. As an agency we are proud to share a formal CRES agreement, allowing us to provide services within our local schools to those who need it. Furthering our efforts to prevent rather than react, we are proud to have collaborated on numerous policies within the schools around the support of sexual exploitation, child abuse, and human trafficking. This year we were also proud to launch a collaborative effort alongside the Huron Perth Catholic District School Board aimed at raising awareness around Human Trafficking concerns in rural communities. This included student, parent, and educator sessions on how we as a community can do our part to end this horrible crime.

As an agency, we are extremely appreciative of our close working relationship with our law enforcement partners across the region. This has included numerous collaboration opportunities for both in person and virtual events, as well as joint initiatives such as our Beyond the Locker Room Pledge Program. All of these efforts, in combination with our ongoing crisis support to first responders target the goal of making support more available to those who need it, as well as promoting healthy community - law enforcement relationships. We are extremely excited to continue to build on these opportunities through future training, support opportunities, and community events similar to the many successes we shared in 2022-2023.

IN OUR COMMUNITY

On top of the formal agreements and partnerships which our agency truly appreciate, we were proud to support and engage with a number of community social services as well as members of the general public this year. This included opportunities to work alongside and support staff from multiple local hospitals, members of the Children's Aid Society, workers from the Canadian Mental Health Association, numerous community groups and clubs such as the Lions Club, Optimists, local sports teams and more! These organizations, as well as the many members of the general public we crossed paths with this year, offer us the ongoing opportunity to promote help for those in need, and create a stronger, healthier community for everyone!




PREVENTION & PUBLIC EDUCATION


The agency feels it is imperative to provide education and awareness to the public to reduce the amount of victimization that takes place. We have developed community training presentations on many topics we feel can support the reduction of gender-based violence crime. We have been able to present these topics within our high school system as well as at Community events; Health Relationships, Cyber Safety and Sextortion, Human Trafficking 101, Human Trafficking Advanced Level, Impacts of Privilege, Trauma and Violence Informed Approach, Threat & Risk assessment as well as Mental Health & Addictions.

There is a stereotype that allows people to believe the issue of Human Trafficking and other Gender Based Violence crime does not exist in Huron County. Our information and experience indicate it does exist; it just looks a little different than it does in our neighbouring urban centres.

We have been able to reach a total of 3,360 youth since April 1st, 2022, until March 31st, 2023, as well as 852 professionals and 238 additional community members in the area.

Services Provided...

Victim Crisis Assistance Ontario (VCAO)

The Victim Crisis Assistance Ontario Program provides support for individuals affected by crime and tragic circumstance and is victim-centered and culturally competent. The menu of services offered by the program includes:

- 24/7 on-scene crisis intervention.
- Addressing immediate safety concerns.
- Community support sessions, needs assessment.
- Development of a personalized referral form or service plan.
- Safety planning.
- Referrals to counselling and community or government support services.
- Enhanced support and follow up.


The Program objectives are:

- To provide crisis intervention, emotional support, information, and referrals to individuals affected by crime and tragic circumstances.
- To reduce the likelihood of further harm by helping a client identify and address safety issues.
- To help clients identify their needs and concerns and develop strategies to address them.


In addition to on-site crisis Intervention, other services offered through the VCAO program include:

- On going follow up phone support and check in sessions with clients waiting for services.
- Safety planning for all eligible victims of crime.
- Referrals to appropriate community supports and services.
- Provision of cell phones for eligible victims.
- Needs assessments and customized service plans.
- Assisting eligible victims with emergency transportation to a safe location; crime-scene cleanup; funeral expenses; emergency home repairs to items that pose a safety risk; and emergency counselling.
- Enhanced support for vulnerable victims.
- Referrals to community agencies.

Key Notes

As the number of people supported each year grows year after year, the complexity of the needs of people touched by these crimes also rises!

We have seen an increase in the frequency and level of violence within each situation. This impacts the speed and ability to heal and move through the trauma to a place of feeling safe again!


There is wide spread impacts to not only the survivors of the direct crime but also the vicarious trauma sustained by the witnesses and loved ones.

Referrals


Referrals are accepted either from within the County or outside as long as the victim resides in Huron County they can be offered support. If the client changes Counties they can be referred to the Victim Services in that area and continue to receive supports.

Our primary referral would be the OPP although in recent years the self referrals have increased significantly. The organization has worked hard to build collaborative relationships with community stakeholders which is illustrated in the increase of "other" referral sources. Public speaking events, media coverage and community presentations have also contributed to the increase in knowledge of the service and provided comfort for people to come forward and seek assistance.

INCOMING REFERRAL SOURCES - 772 TOTAL




OUTGOING REFERRAL SOURCES - 4320 TOTAL



Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP+)

The Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP+) responds to the most urgent needs of victims of violent crime, offering timely access to resources and emergency funds. Victims might be eligible for financial assistance related to emergency expenses - securing premises, transportation, crime scene clean-up, funeral expenses, counselling services - short-term, early intervention. Victim Services will apply on behalf of a victim of crime to explore what supports they may be eligible for.


INDIVIDUALS SUPPORTED BY VQRP+ BY CRIME TYPE - 202
