## Message from the Chair

It is with great respect and appreciation that I present the Board Chair's Report for the 2024-2025 fiscal year at Victim Services Huron Perth.

This past year has been one of continued growth, resilience, and collaboration. As we reflect on our work supporting victims of crime and trauma, I am struck by the strength not only of the individuals we serve but of the dedicated staff, volunteers, and partners who make our services possible.

Under the leadership of our Executive Director, Deborah Logue, our organization has expanded its reach and refined its approach to delivering trauma-informed, client-centred support within Perth County as well as Huron. We have focused on strengthening partnerships with law enforcement, health services, and community organizations to ensure all viable referrals are made and supported quickly and efficiently across both counties.

As a Board, our role is to ensure strong governance, strategic direction, and financial stewardship. Over the past year, we have:

- Completed a four-year strategic review to align our goals with long-term community needs.
- Supported new funding applications and diversification of current revenue streams.
- Recruited new Board members to strengthen representation, geographic boundaries and skills diversity.

Our deepest thanks go to the frontline staff and volunteers—those who answer late-night calls, sit with survivors in moments of crisis, and help navigate complex legal and emotional landscapes. You are the face of compassion in some of the darkest moments people experience.

To our Executive Director, thank you for your steady hands and forward-thinking vision. To our funders, donors, and community partners: your support is critical. Every dollar and every partnership help us extend our reach and deepen our impact.

And to our clients: Thank you for trusting us. Your courage reminds us why this work matters. It is not easy, but it is meaningful, and we are privileged to do it alongside all of you.

## Message from the Executive Director

This year has been one of significant transition and transformation, and I am honoured to lead an organization so deeply committed to supporting individuals in their most vulnerable moments.

Perhaps the most defining moment of this year was the joining of Perth County to Victim Services of Huron County, officially uniting us as **Victim Services Huron Perth**. This process was thoughtful, collaborative, and grounded in a shared vision: to better serve victims and survivors through stronger infrastructure, increased capacity, and unified leadership.

Bringing two teams, boards, and operational systems together is never a small task. But what stood out was the professionalism, flexibility, and compassion with which our staff and volunteers approached this change. From frontline service to administration, we saw true teamwork in action—and the result is an organization that is now more resilient, efficient, and ready for the future.

Over the last year, we have seen an increase in calls for support within both regions. In part, this is due to the new position created within Huron and Perth OPP and Stratford Police to have a liaison staff that ensures all Intimate Partner Violence crimes are referred to Victim Services for support. This position has fostered further relationship building with the police services, which in turn provides enhanced support to the clients.

Even with the increase in calls for support, we have been able to provide the emotional support and practical assistance to support every call to date. Ensuring appropriate safety planning is completed and needs are met has continued to be our top priority when supporting our clients.

With the uptick in service utilization, we have been focused on internal growth. We have standardized operational procedures and service protocols, streamlined data and reporting systems for improved accountability, strengthened relationships with police and community stakeholders, and increased staffing capacity. We are thankful to Stratford Police for welcoming us into their building to share space and be on hand to support clients directly. The proximity to front-line officers makes referrals more streamlined and quicker to make.

Victim Services Huron Perth has fantastic people. The volunteer Board, volunteer Crisis Responders, and the staff make this work appear easy and make support to people who need it a reality! Thank you to the staff, and a special thanks to ALL the volunteers. You are all truly appreciated.

It is my pleasure to thank the Board of Directors for their valuable work in sharing their areas of expertise and guiding our organization forward. We appreciate your energy and commitment to making VSHP valuable,

accountable, and successful. The wealth of support and encouragement the Board offers is difficult to summarize and demonstrate the full appreciation it deserves.

The ongoing services and program development would not have been possible without the generous support from our donors, funders, volunteers, and stakeholders, direction from the Board of Directors and the staff's commitment. In partnership with VQRP+ (Victim Quick Response Program+), we continue to advocate for the needs within our community. We strive better to communicate the uniqueness of our program to the public. ## New Organization

### Welcoming Perth to Join Huron

May 1, 2024, marked the official unification of Perth County, joining Victim Services Huron to become Victim Services Huron Perth. The merger was driven by a shared vision to enhance service delivery, reduce duplication, and streamline operations while maintaining a strong commitment to supporting victims of crime and trauma in both communities. We have been able to

- Expand coverage and accessibility across a broader geographic area.
- Enhance program consistency and service standards.
- Improve operational efficiency and reduce administrative costs.
- Foster a more robust support network for clients and staff.

Throughout the transition, priority was given to minimizing disruption to services and maintaining high-quality client care. Staff worked collaboratively to align protocols, integrate support systems, and build a cohesive organizational culture. We commend their dedication and professionalism during this period of change. As a unified organization, we are better positioned to respond to community needs, advocate for victims, and continue building partnerships that strengthen our impact.

## Project Lifesaver – Perth County



Project Lifesaver is a program we support within Perth County. It supports vulnerable individuals in our community who are at risk of wandering due to cognitive conditions such as Alzheimer's, autism, and other related disorders. The program equips participants with personalized radio-frequency transmitters that enable trained emergency responders to quickly locate and return them safely home.

Victim Services Huron Perth's role is to ensure proper enrollment, updates to the data system, and bimonthly battery changes. Over the past year, we have offered a six-month free trial opportunity for new participants through fundraised dollars. We want to ensure peace of mind for families and caregivers.

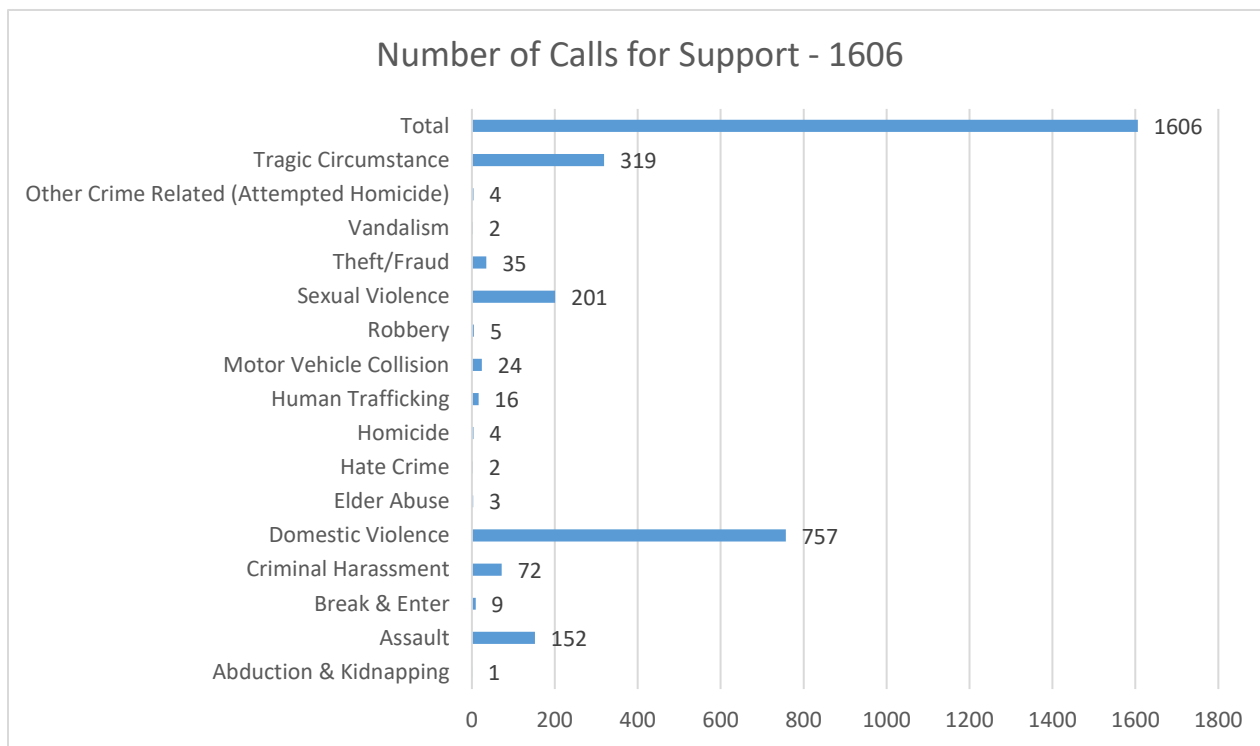
As we look ahead, we remain committed to expanding Project Lifesaver's awareness and accessibility to those who need it most.

## Support Services

### Victim Crisis Assistance Ontario

Victim Crisis Assistance Ontario Program provides support for individuals affected by crime and tragic circumstances and is victim-centered and culturally competent. The menu of services offered by the program includes:

- 24/7 on-scene crisis intervention.
- Addressing immediate safety concerns,
- Community support sessions- needs assessment.
- Development of a personalized service plan.
- Referrals to counselling and community or government support services.
- Enhanced support and follow-up.



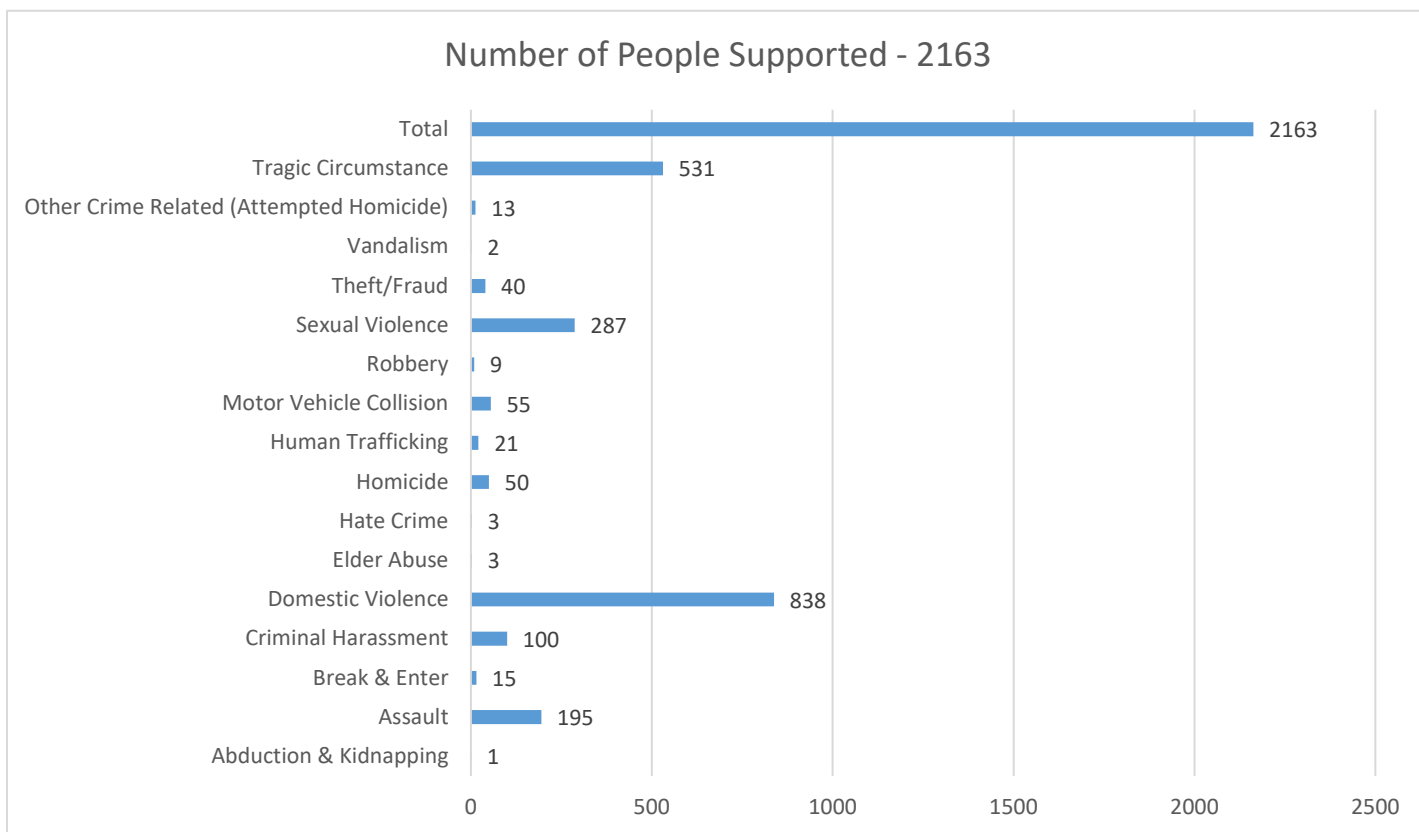
**The Program objectives are:**

- To provide crisis intervention, emotional support, information, and referrals to individuals affected by crime and tragic circumstances.
- To reduce the likelihood of further harm by helping a client identify and address safety issues.
- To help clients identify their needs and concerns and develop strategies to address them.

**In addition to on-site crisis Intervention, other services offered through the VCAO program include:**

- Safety planning for all eligible victims of crime with enhanced supports for vulnerable victims.
- Referrals to appropriate community support and services.
- Needs assessments and customized service plans with referrals to community agencies.
- Assisting eligible victims with emergency transportation to a safe location, crime-scene cleanup, funeral expenses, emergency home repairs to items that pose a safety risk, and emergency counselling.

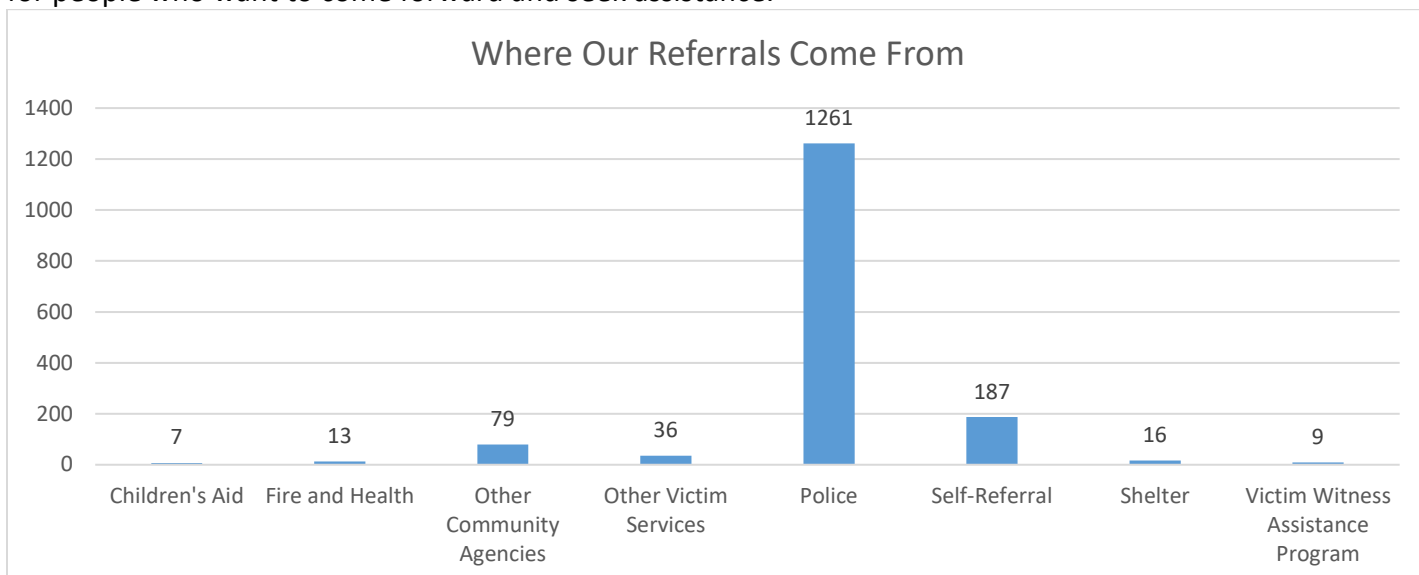

## Referrals

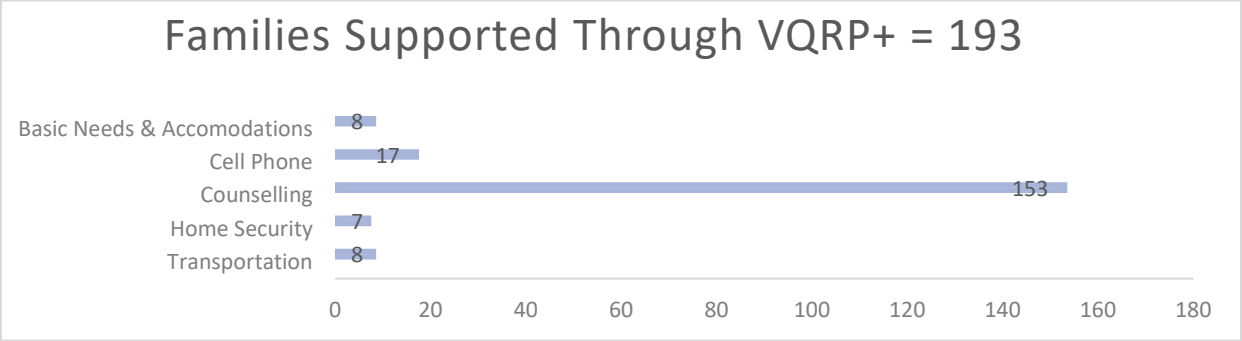
Referrals are accepted from anywhere, and as long as the victim resides in Huron or Perth County, they can be offered support. If the client changes Counties, they can be referred to the Victim Services in that area and continue to receive support.

Our primary referral would be from the police, although self-referrals have increased significantly in recent years. The organization has worked hard to build collaborative relationships with community stakeholders, illustrated by the increase in “other” referral sources. Public speaking events, media coverage, and community presentations have also contributed to increasing knowledge of the service and provided comfort for people who want to come forward and seek assistance.



## Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP+), included in the VCAO

This program responds to the most urgent needs of victims of violent crime, offering timely access to resources and emergency funds. Victims may be eligible for financial assistance related to emergency expenses - securing premises, transportation, crime scene clean-up, homicide funeral expenses, counselling services, short-term, early intervention. Victim Services will apply on behalf of a victim of a crime to explore what support they may be eligible for.



## Prevention & Public Education

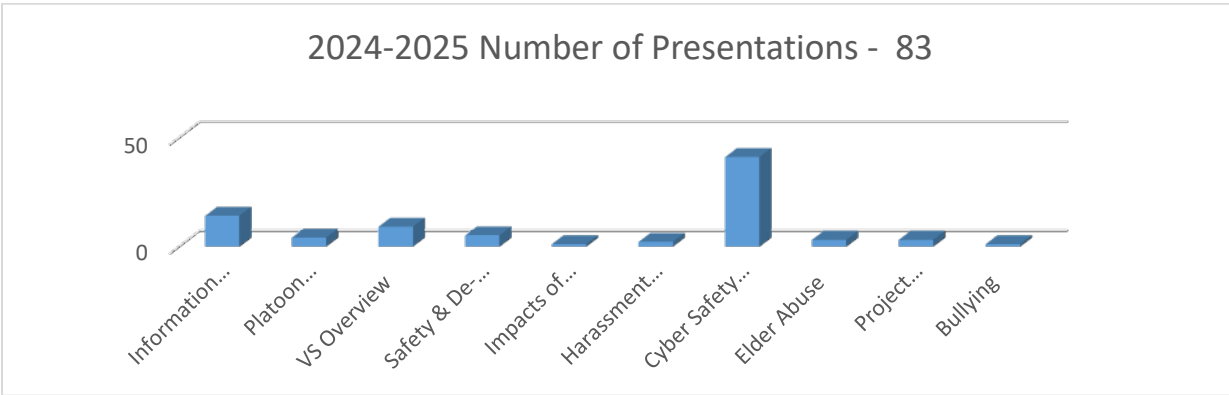
The agency feels it is imperative to provide education and awareness to the public to reduce the amount of victimization that takes place. We have developed community training presentations on many topics we feel can support the reduction of gender-based violence crime. We have been able to present these topics within our high school system, as well as at Community events: Health Relationships, Cyber Safety and Sextortion, Human Trafficking 101, Human Trafficking Advanced Level, Impacts of Privilege, Trauma and Violence Informed Approach, Threat & Risk assessment, as well as Mental Health & Addictions.

There is a stereotype that allows people to believe the issue of Human Trafficking and other Gender-Based violence crimes does not exist in Huron County. Our information and experience indicate it exists; it just looks a little different than in our neighbouring urban centres.

We have reached a total of 1332 people with our public education program.

### Vision

Education and awareness are essential to both the prevention of the crime and the reduction of trauma when supports are in place quickly.

#### National Victims & Survivors of Crime Awareness Week

Vicarious Trauma is something that impacts all first responders as they are exposed to difficult situations with limited capacity to make positive change for the person suffering. This can be a difficult burden to shoulder as volunteers. Victim Services Huron Perth wanted to invest in training to better foster longevity within our volunteer team by providing tools to navigate the difficult situations we may be involved in. We welcomed Kim Hagle from Radiant Vitality to speak and provide these necessary tools while a catered meal was prepared by Added Touch Catering, which allowed for some social mingling and team-building opportunities. It was a well-attended and valued event.

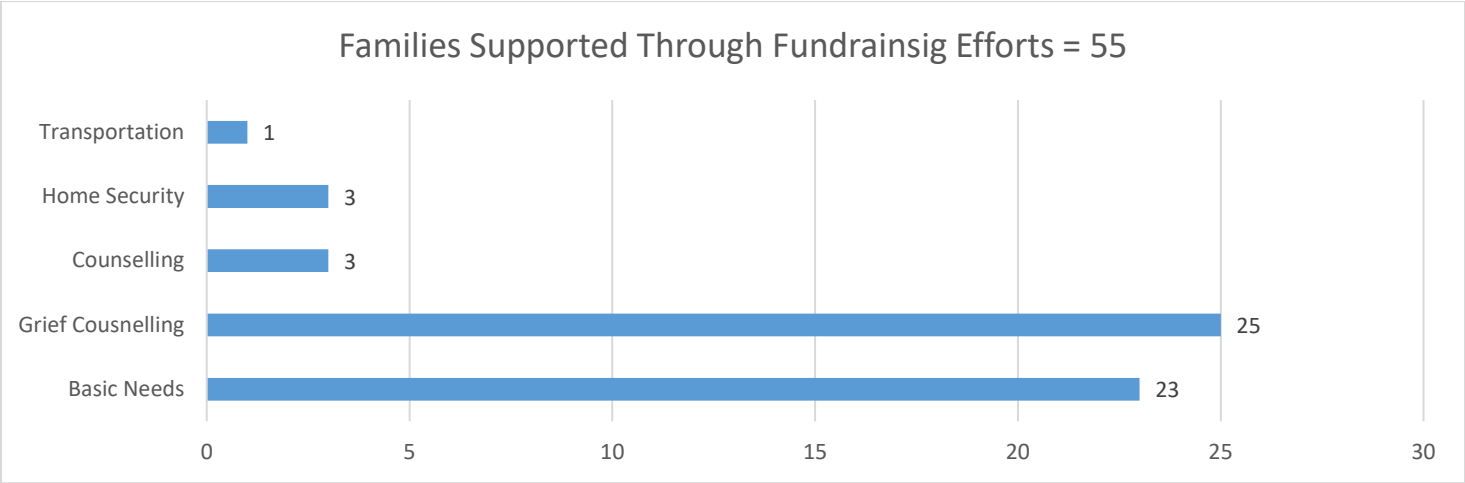


### General Donations
